Appendix II – General Information

B1 - Basis for Preparation

The Schryver Logistics Sustainability Report has been prepared on a voluntary basis and following the recommendation of the European Union Commission from July 2025 applies the VSME reporting standard (Voluntary Sustainability Reporting Standard for non-listed SMEs). To provide additional clarity and transparency for our stakeholders, we have complimented the VSME reporting standard with requirements from the European Sustainability Reporting Standards (ESRS), for example by conducting a double materiality assessment and by disclosing on sustainability governance and controls.

VSME Reporting Options & Exclusions

Schryver has opted to report on both the 'basic' and 'comprehensive' VSME-standard modules. We have chosen not to omit any disclosures under the provisions of paragraphs 19 and 24. (b) of the VSME-Standard.

Scope of Consolidation

Statements and data included in this report cover all Schryver entities with operational control, as defined by a shareholding of >50%. As an exception to this, subsidiaries with a shareholding of >50% , but contributing less than 1% to total revenue and/or with no material business activities were excluded based on materiality. In addition, 'Fast Truck Ltd.' (a minority ownership) has been included on the basis of materiality, since this entity owns and operates heavy-duty vehicles, thereby significantly contributing to our Scope 1 energy consumption and GHG emissions.

Where available, we also attempted to collect and report data for previous time periods to provide reference points and to allow for assessing the progress already made.

Schryver has aligned the time-horizons for the purposes of non-financial reporting with the definitions set out in the ESRs 1 (Chapter 6.4). 'Short-term' refers to one year, 'medium-term' to a period of between one and five years and 'long-term' to between five and ten years.

Appendix III – Methodology and Accounting Information

B3 – Energy and GHG Emissions

Our GHG Inventory is based on operational control and has been prepared according to the GHG Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard. The calculation of GHG emissions includes an additional 2.5% safety margin.

Scope 1 & 2 – Fuels and Electricity: Primary activity based data has been collected for all reporting entities. For market-based emissions, utility provider specific emission factors have been applied where available. Alternatively, national government statistics or third party emission factors have been applied (GEMIS 5.1 and EEW 2025).

Scope 3.1 – Purchased Goods and Services: 96% of purchased goods and services expenditures result from purchased logistic services. As such *only* purchased logistic services are in scope for estimating scope 3.1 emissions. 100% of purchased logistics services emissions have been estimated using activity based data. For ocean and air transportation, a carrier specific activity based emission factor has been applied based on cargo weight and distance (tkm). For road transportation a fuel specific emission factor has been applied to estimate emissions based on gross cargo weight and distance (tkm).

Scope 3.2 – Capital Goods: Capital goods contain all new additions to tangible fixed assets as defined by HGB (Category 2 Property, Plant, Equipment). It contains provisions for new buildings, vehicles and office equipment. Emissions have been estimated using spend-based emission factors (DEFRA 2020, Exiobase v3.8.2, US EPA 2020).

Scope 3.6 – Business Travel: Emissions for business travel have been estimated using spend-based emission factors (Exiobase v3.8.2). Due to limited data segregation, a global overall emission factor has been applied using a spend-based average of air- and land-based travel as well as for accommodation.

Scope 3.7 – Employee Commuting: Emissions have been estimated using office specific sampling of average commuting distances and mode of transportation split. Provision have been made to include accurate number of working days for each office considering vacation, sick leave and home office. Activity based emission factors (Gemis 5.1) have been applied to estimate total emissions for each mode of transport and based on commuting distance.

B6 – Water

Where available, water withdrawal is based on primary activity data. Alternatively, we have estimated our water-withdrawal based on national statistics. These average at about 800 litres per employee per month in the countries that we operate. The risk-assessment to identify water-use in high water-stress areas was carried out in 2025 at an office-location level using the Aqueduct Water Risk Atlas Tool (World Resources Institute).

B9 – Workforce Health & Safety

The total number of hours worked has been estimated using the following assumptions: 220 working days per year, full-time work equals 8 hours per day, part-time work equals 4 hours per day.

The calculation of the injury frequency rate is based on the VSME-Standard guidance. Accordingly, the number of work-related accidents is divided by the number of hours worked in a year by all employees, the sum of which is multiplied by 200,000 (to represent 100 full-time employees).

B9 – Remuneration, Collective Bargaining and Training

The weighted and unadjusted gender-pay-gap has been determined by calculating the average weighted hourly pay of both female and male employees (weighted by number of employees) per country. According to the VSME methodology, the average weighted female pay is then deducted from the average weighted male pay, the sum of which is divided by the average weighted male pay and multiplied with 100.

Minimum wage compliance has been assessed by comparing the lowest hourly wage with the legal minimum wage required by national law.

Training hours are based on training records or estimations if data availability is limited.
